FAST FACTS of Cornell IFC

- In the Spring 2023 semester, Cornell fraternity and sorority members constituted approximately 20.74% of the total undergraduate student population.
- In terms of the total number of fraternity and sorority chapters on campus, Cornell University is the 9th largest in the nation.
- The Cornell IFC welcomes and celebrates students of all races, ethnicities, religions, nationalities, sexualities, gender identities, gender expressions, and disabilities.
- The first president of Cornell University, Andrew Dickson White, was fundamentally opposed to the dormitory system and encouraged seven fraternities to establish their chapter houses near campus during Cornell's first year.
- A.D. White believed fraternities encouraged responsibility on the part of their members and referred to them as, "the best substitute possible for the family relation." Additionally he held personal membership in three chapters: Sigma Phi, Psi Upsilon, and Alpha Sigma Phi.
- A.D. White's distaste for dormitories as they existed in 1868 and his encouragement of fraternity development remains with us today in the form of a large fraternity system that can trace its beginnings to the very early years of Cornell's existence.
- In Spring 2023, compared to the Nationwide IFC Community average GPA of 3.10, the overall Cornell IFC Community average GPA was significantly higher, at 3.46.
- In Spring 2023, compared to the Nationwide IFC New Member average GPA of 2.99, the overall Cornell IFC New Member average GPA was significantly higher, at 3.40.
- In Spring 2023, compared to the Overall Cornell-All average GPA of 3.43, the overall Cornell IFC Community average GPA was higher, at 3.46.
- In the 2022-2023 Academic Year, the Cornell IFC Community completed 7,882 community service hours.
- In the 2022-2023 Academic Year, the Cornell IFC Community raised \$97,028 for philanthropic causes.

- Compared to the Housing & Dining rates charged by Cornell University or living in a Collegetown apartment, it is on average more affordable to live in a fraternity chapter house.
- All 29 Cornell IFC fraternity chapter houses are historic, breathtaking properties, which have been constructed on the steps of Cornell's campus, ensuring easy accessibility throughout their time living in the chapter house.
- Fraternity house amenities can include in-house private libraries, 24/7
 access to a full kitchen and private chef, gyms and weight rooms,
 out-door spaces, TV rooms and common areas, free laundry and
 more.
- Fraternities sponsor unique professional development opportunities.
 By joining fraternities, members gain vast networks and are invited to attend exclusive IFC professional events.
- A majority of fraternity members land internships and jobs from fellow alumni brothers.
- While each fraternity chapter has their own designated scholarships they distribute to new and current members, based on the publicly avail-able tax returns of these non-profit Alumni Associations across all 29 chap-ters, it is estimated that between \$300,000 to \$375,000 is annually distribut-ed to new and current members in the form of scholarships.
- During the Spring 2023 and Fall 2023, the Cornell IFC Executive Board distributed \$16,000 through the New Member Dues Incentive program.
- The Cornell fraternity and sorority community contains 180 members who are also University Varsity Athletes.
- The IFC Intramural Athletics League is a vibrant facet of fraternity life.
 From inner-tube water polo to basketball, playing intramural sports with your brothers is a great way to exercise, have fun, and meet students in other chapters.
- The leadership skills of fraternity members are not limited to their respec-tive chapters. In fact, many of the 1000+ non-Greek student organizations are led by Greek life members.

WHY CORNELL IFC?

Joining a fraternity at Cornell opens the door to limitless opportunities and lifelong friendships.

The affiliated Cornell community enhances your personal growth and individuality while linking you to a brotherhood that shares your goals and values. With 1 in 5 undergraduate males at Cornell holding membership in an IFC fraternity chapter, and as the 9th largest Greek life community in the nation in terms of total chapters, our fraternities will offer you an unforgettable college experience.

Academics – Fraternity members are drivn to succeed in the classroom. More often than not, the average GPA of an IFC fraternity member is higher than that of a non-affiliated student at Cornell. To ensure academic growth, each chapter prides itself on strong peer and alumni support. From peer mentoring programs and workshops on time management to study hours and study groups, your fraternity will equip you with the tools to achieve academic excellence.

Community Service and Philanthropy – In Fall 2023, each of our 29 IFC fraternities completed at least one community service oriented event which was targeted to benefit the local Ithaca community. Additionally, Cornell fraternities host countless philanthropic fundraising events throughout the year for nonprofit organizations.

Leadership – A fraternity is the ideal place for students to develop their leadership skills. Fraternities are the only self-governing organizations on campus that allow students to truly shape the future of their groups. At Cornell, each chapter offers a wide range of chapter leadership opportunities, as well as leadership retreats, guest lecturers, and scholarships. Finally, an overwhelming majority of Cornell's 1000+ campus organizations have at least one executive board member who is also a member of a Cornell IFC fraternity.

Professional Development – As a fraternity member, you'll join a vast network of established, influential global leaders in a variety of industries and professions. Although being a Cornellian already opens up incredible career opportunities, the professional benefits for fraternity members are even more vast. Every year, countless fraternity members land internships and jobs from fellow fraternity alumni members. Further, many fraternities host alumni career series, resume critiques and mock interviews, and alumni networking events.

Friendship – One of the greatest benefits of joining a fraternity is the lifelong friendships and bonds that you will form with your brothers. From tough prelims to job interviews, and every other challenge you will face at Cornell your brothers will always have your back every step of the way. These lifelong friendships create numerous opportunities for networking and social interaction, even long after graduation.

Social – While fraternity members pride themselves for their excellence in scholarship, leadership, and service, there are ample opportunities for fun and relaxation as a Cornell fraternity member. From brotherhood events to formals, fraternity members bond with one another and meet students in other fraternity chapters. Balancing work with an active social life is a skill fraternity and sorority members take with them beyond college and into the working world.

Historic Tradition – Fraternities have been a part of Cornell University for over 155 years, beginning in 1868, just three years after the founding of the University. In fact, both of Cornell University's co-founders, Ezra Cornell and Andrew Dickson White, were in support of the comprehensive fraternity system developing on campus during these formative years. As voiced by A.D. White on numerous occasions, he argued that fraternities encouraged responsibility on the part of their members and referred to them as, "the best substitute possible for the family relation." Ever since then, fraternities have played an integral role in the student experience on the Hill. When you join a fraternity at Cornell, you are joining a community that is as established and storied as the University itself.

FAQs

1. What is the Interfraternity Council (IFC) at Cornell University?

The Cornell IFC is the self-governing body of our 29 individual chapters and 1500+ individuals within our community.

2. How many fraternities are part of the IFC at Cornell?

The Cornell IFC comprises 29 fraternity chapters.

3. What is the purpose of the IFC at Cornell?

The Cornell IFC exists to promote the shared interests and values of our member fraternities: leadership, service, brotherhood, and scholarship. Additionally, the IFC advances the academic mission of Cornell, enables fraternal organizations to grow and thrive through collaboration and teamwork, provides an outlet for self-governance and accountability, and models ethical leadership.

4. What does the term "PNM" refer to?

"PNM" is the acronym used for the term "Potential New Member." A PNM is defined as a fully matriculated Cornell University student who has registered for IFC Formal Recruitment or has reached out to the IFC Advisor to communicate their interest in joining a member chapter. To be eligible for Formal Recruitment, a PNM must have either completed one full semester at Cornell University or be a first-semester sophomore transfer student.

5. What is formal recruitment, and when does it take place?

Formal Recruitment is the designated period of time each semester when the Cornell IFC organizes recruitment efforts for our fraternity chapters to promote the recruitment of new members. Specifically, the Formal Recruitment Period is the period of time when a majority of PNMs join Cornell IFC member chapter organizations. This period encompasses one week before the PNM recruitment meeting until after the bid acceptance deadline.

6. I am a first-year student in my first semester at Cornell University, am I eligible to participate in IFC Formal Recruitment?

No, due to Cornell University's policy on Deferred Recruitment, new First Year Fall Admits and First Year Spring Admits must complete one full academic semester at Cornell before they are eligible to participate in Formal Recruitment. This policy encourages students to focus on building solid and positive academic habits and adjust to college life. We believe it is best for each cohort of new students to wait until their second semester at Cornell to be eligible to join a sorority or fraternity. Deferred recruitment for new students was instituted by student and faculty leadership in the 1950s and will continue to be Cornell's policy. Second year Transfer students are permitted to join a sorority or fraternity their first semester at Cornell.

7. Are there any eligibility requirements to participate in fraternity recruitment?

The four eligibility requirements to participate in Formal Recruitment are;

- (1) attending college while not simultaneously enrolled in high school,
- (2) being an undergraduate, regularly matriculated student, according to the definition of matriculation established by Cornell University, (3) if a first-year or transfer student, the student must have completed one full academic semester at an accredited higher education institution, and
- (4) attaining at least a 2.25 cumulative GPA in the prior semester.

8. How can I register for Formal Recruitment?

Interested PNMs must register on the Campus Director platform at the Cornell IFC webpage or Instagram Bio @cornellifc.

9. Is there a fee to participate in Formal Recruitment?

No, there is no fee to register for or participate in Cornell IFC Formal Recruitment. This is a deliberate effort by the Cornell IFC to enable the most number of individuals interested in IFC fraternities to participate in our Formal Recruitment process.

10. If I accept a bid to a fraternity chapter, how long is the new member education period?

Pursuant to a Cornell University regulation from about 10 years ago, the maximum length of the new member education period is 4-weeks long, and begins after the conclusion of the Formal Recruitment process.
